
# KNIGHT'S TALES



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## **SEASONAL CHANGES**

## FOR RECEPTION CHILDREN

This term they have been learning about seasonal changes and when they are outside they have been finding out what happens during the autumn and winter. At the start of term they saw all the apples falling off the trees and by the end of term they were finding out why lots of trees lose their leaves. They always enjoy visiting the goats and have learnt about what animals need to live, how to look after them and what they eat.









## YEAR 1 DISCOVER DINOSAURS

At the start of term the Year 1 children were very lucky to have a visit from a mysterious animal. As they stomped through the grounds following a trail of footprints, they spotted a nest of exotic eggs on the mound. After much excitement, they waited patiently to discover they had hatched into baby dinosaurs. Throughout the course of the term they have enjoyed many cross-curricular learning experiences. The children loved making and baking delicious dinosaur biscuits with Mr Redman and developed their DT skills creating excellent dinosaur egg baskets with Mrs Hicks. The children were very fortunate to go on their first trip outside of school, as they ventured into Oxford to visit the Museum of Natural History to go behind the scenes as Dinosaur Detectives. They relished opportunities to handle real dinosaur fossils, role-play fossilisation and see the first fossil, of the first dinosaur ever discovered!







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## YEAR 2 SOAR WITH EAGLES

Year 2 were lucky enough to visit the Millets Falconry Centre before half term to meet some amazing birds. Firstly they were given a tour of the centre and met many other interesting animals including owls, vultures, hawks and even a noisy kookaburra.

The children each had the opportunity for some bird handling, and they were then treated to a flying show. It was a super day out with the good company of well-behaved and interested children who received many compliments.









## YEAR 3 ENJOY A CORNISH CREAM TEA

The afternoon tea was inspired by the book Year 3 have been reading this half term, The Mousehole Cat by Antonia Barber. It is set in Cornwall (hence the Cornish afternoon tea!) and is about the legend of a fisherman called Tom and his cat called Mowzer (which is why the children brought in their cuddly toy cats.) They go out to sea in a storm, calm the storm and then bring back fish for the hungry villagers. 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## YEAR 4 GET CREATIVE WITH THE OXFORD STORY MUSEUM



Year 4 spent a fantastic morning with Mags from The Oxford Story Museum exploring many wonderful and imaginative stories. There were lots of games and fun warm-up activities to begin with, followed by stories about sausage noses and monkeys! The children were then given the opportunity to plan a story about an animal with a dream - we had pigs in space, tigers in a band, and a penguin who wanted to climb a mountain! Next, the children worked brilliantly in teams and acted out their creative stories to the rest of the year group. We all felt inspired by the lively and informative workshop to go and write many more stories. Maggs's last piece of advice was to 'Keep telling stories' which we know Year 4 definitely will.







## YEAR 5 LAND AND WAVE

What an action packed three days. The weather was sublime and we started straight from the off with Paddle boarding down in Swanage. The Pupils did half a session on the jumbo paddle boards where balance and games were aplenty followed by a go on the individual paddle boards. These are so much harder and core strength is the key. The sea was like a mill pond and with the sun reflecting off the water we really could have been in the Caribbean.

An evening set of sports and teamwork activities were completed as the sun slowly went down over the nearby Corfe Castle.

Day two was a mix of Catapult building, where knot tying and teamwork were needed, followed by Kayaking on the open sea. As there was no wind the waves were minimal and that made the activity so much more enjoyable. We played more games involving capsizing the boats, jumping in and switching positions in the boat which were all great fun.

On our second evening we had a huge campfire, with marshmallows, and we played a movie drama game which the pupils loved.

We have done many of these types of trips and this one really did top them. The weather, the pupils and the sleeping (we got about 8 hours each night!) were all fantastic. This has been a wonderful way to start their journey into Upper Prep. Friendships were formed and cemented.















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## **HOUSE MATCHES**

### **House Hockey**

The Girls' House Hockey matches were once again a fiercely contested affair. The teams from Richardson, Poltimore and Astley all displayed great competitive spirit whilst remaining encouraging to all those in their own house and beyond. In the Year 3 and Year 4 competition Poltimore were dominant winning all of their games whilst Richardson proved to be the most accomplished team in the Year 5 and Year 6 matches. Ultimately the combined results saw Poltimore taking the prize which sets the year up nicely for the remaining House sports fixtures.







### **House Rugby**

The sports department were delighted this term to welcome parents back as spectators of Girls' Hockey and Boys' Rugby. There were fixtures every week against our local schools which were keenly contested. Yet, as is usual the most keenly contested matches were the House ones held in November.

In the morning it looked like it would be a wet afternoon but the showers held off and battle commenced on the astroturf and the fields. The Year 3 and 4 boys played games of tag rugby with Years 5 and 6 playing the contact game.

Richardson were victorious at Rugby.











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## PRE-PREP ART

Year 1 has been learning all about colour theory and dinosaurs. They focused on primary and secondary colours, learning how to colour mix along the way. While looking at different dinosaurs they had a go at turning themselves into prehistoric moths thinking about how to create a mirrored pattern.













Year 2 have been focusing on the theme of Journeys this term and have used this as inspiration to create paper mache hot air balloons. They finished off their balloons by adding a paper woven basket underneath. Year 2 also looked at colour mixing, blending and collage to create wonderful sailing boat pictures.









Year 3 have been looking at the work of Frederique Hundertwasser, they then had a go at creating 'lollipop trees' in his style. They used oil pastels to create a vibrant background and card to create pop up trees adding a 3d element to their work.

## PREP ART

The Year 4's wonderful mixed media collages of 'squashed fairy' illustrations are based on 'Lady Cottington's Pressed Fairy Book', written by Monty Python's Terry Jones, and illustrated by artist Brian Froud.










Year 5 used magazine cutouts to create these stunning collages of gardens. They then used a range of experimental watercolour techniques to paint the scenes.













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## **GIRLS' SPORT**

The Prep girls enjoyed a return to inter-school Hockey matches this term. In Years 5 & 6 the girls played against local schools such as Beachborough, Ashfold, Cranford House and Rupert House. They recorded some good results along the way and demonstrated a deepening understanding of the game itself. The U10 girls once again hosted the U10 Invitational Hockey Tournament and the U11s represented Chandlings at the St Edwards School Hockey Festival; both of which were highly valuable and enjoyable experiences.



In Years 3 & 4, girls continued to develop their basic technical skills for passing, dribbling and tackling. They all enjoyed learning more about the game and for many this term provided their first experience of hosting and attending fixtures with other schools. The coaching team were extremely impressed with how the girls acquitted themselves, whether playing in mixed Year 3 & 4 matches or within their own age groups.

## **GIRLS' FOOTBALL**

In the latter part of the term the girls made the switch to Football for the first time. In three introductory weeks of sessions they developed their passing, dribbling and shooting skills whilst also learning more about the game through match play. Girls Football is a new addition to the Girls' Games Program. This term we hosted St Hughs, SHSK, Beachborough and Ashfold school in our first ever Girls Football Festival. The event was designed as a friendly afternoon of mixed ability matches in which the girls could grow their knowledge and experience of the game. Although the afternoon began under the backdrop of a beautiful double rainbow, soon the icy rain and winds descended and threatened to halt the afternoon's play. Not to be deterred, all the girls showed tremendous resilience to not only continue playing but to do so with smiles on their faces. Throughout the afternoon lots of progress was made by all schools and the players thoroughly enjoyed the experience. A huge thank you to the visiting schools for approaching the fixture with the right spirit and we look forward to hosting the Festival again next year.



## BOYS' SPORT IAPS U11A BOY'S RUGBY

The U11 rugby season ended for Year 6 boys with their final games for Chandlings being played in the IAPS Festival hosted by Stroud School in Eastleigh. They got off to a flying start winning their first 3 games against Seaford College (2 - 1), Lambrook (3 - 1) and Salisbury Cathedral (3 - 0). They then came across Princes Meade and Hawthorns and conceded 8 tries without reply which left them 3rd in their group of 6.

In the playoff game for 5th and 6th place they let Embery Prep in for the first score but showed great resilience to come fighting back to go ahead 2 - 1 and finish the game off with a try in the dying seconds. 5th place overall from 12 schools was a satisfying result in a festival of real talent.







## YEARS 3 - 6 BOYS' SPORT

For many of the boys and their parents in Years 3 and 4 this was the first opportunity to be together at sports fixtures. Many came to watch and the boys responded with some terrific performances in at least 5 or more matches. Year 6 played an IAPS rugby festival whilst Year 5 travelled into the city for a rugby festival at St Edwards. As is the case with RFU protocols there are no finals at a festival but it is fair to say the boys played really well winning more games than they lost. Both Year 3 and Year 4 managed to equate themselves equally well at the Abingdon festival.

The FA are less strict with tournament organisation so pride of place goes to the Year 3 football team who won the Summer Fields U8 tournament from a field of 22 teams. It was a nail biting affair with the scores being equal at full time and so it was decided on penalties. Chandlings held their nerve and were victorious by 4 penalties to 1 over Caldicott.

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## **HOUSE SINGING COMPETITION**

Children and staff alike were all very excited about the inaugural House Singing competition which took place this term.

Each house chose three different songs which they then shared with Miss Sharpe, the Head of Music who helped them pick the final song they would sing at the competition.

The children spent many weeks rehearsing adding moves, harmony and working on their diction and

The day arrived and the three judges took their seats in anticipation. Mrs Davis was looking for tuning, Mrs Siriwardene wanted to be entertained and Miss Sharp was keen to make sure the diction was crisp.

Astley began with an uplifting version of 'High Hopes' which had some wonderful changes between year groups and a great crescendo at the end. Poltimore followed with a very dramatic and emotional rendition of 'Do You Hear the People Sing?' from the musical Les Miserables. It brought the odd tear to the audience's eyes! Richardson finished the competition with a rousing performance of Elton John's 'I'm Still Standing' which contained some fantastic air guitar moves.

The judges deliberated and it was a very tough decision. However, the winners were Poltimore.

When asked if they wanted to do the House singing competition next year the whole room put up their hands. We're already looking forward to it!















## **OUTDOOR LEARNING**

Outdoor learning has always been an important part of life at Chandlings and as well as all the usual outdoor activities, we have dedicated weekly Outdoor Classroom lessons as part of our curriculum which are taught by Miss Papp.

This term's topic was trees, leaves and habitats.

The children looked at structures of trees and identified trees in autumn and winter. They worked both in groups and independently. All the activities linked with the curriculum and were based on children's knowledge from their classroom settings.

They also had a great time with their 'Leaf Throwing Championships' which you might have seen on our social media!

As part of our Wellbeing programme at Chandlings Prep we have Feel Good Friday.
