


YEAR 1 VR HEADSET **EXPERIENCE**

First they talked about the role of a firefighter and we learnt that it is not only to fight fires, but there are also many other types of rescues that they are involved in. We also learnt about how to keep ourselves and our families safe with at least 2 smoke alarms in our homes. YEAR 3 VISIT THE CORINIUM MUSEUM

Year 3 thoroughly enjoyed exploring the modern galleries during our trip to the Corinium Museum in Cirencester.

After lunch everyone had the chance to explore the many objects on display in greater detail. The children worked enthusiastically in small groups as they searched amongst the artefacts so that they could find answers to the questions posed in their workbooks.

YEAR 3 AND YEAR 4 **POETRY WALK**

As part of our poetry focus for World Book Week, Year 3 and Year 4 enjoyed a Poetry Walk, inspired by nature, throughout the school grounds. A variety of poems, relating to various locations within the school, were discovered by the pupils. The children read and discussed the poems, the poetic devices within them and selected their favourite line.

The poems the children found included one about bees by the beehives, a poem on birds at the bird hide, a poem on ducks by the pond and a poem about climbing trees in the Nursery Woodland. The children finished with a deliciously warming hot chocolate!

Outdoor learning is a large part of life at Chandlings Prep and the walk drew together the focus on poetry and the importance of nature at our school. It also inspired the children to write their own poems as part of a whole school initiative.





YEAR 5 TAKE US ON A JOURNEY THROUGH **TUDOR TIMES**

This term, Year 5 have been reading 'The Devil and His Boy,' a historical novel set in Tudor times by Anthony Horowitz. With this as a backdrop they have written both prose and poetry inspired by both the book and a film called Pudding Lane which led them down the dark alleyways of Tudor London. They also created a 3D model of Shakespeare's Globe theatre which was built during this period.

ART RECEPTION

EASTER BASKETS & CARDS

This term, as a part of the STEM curriculum, the children in Reception have been learning how to weave using paper. They created an A4 size weaved page which was curled into a basket shape, complete with handle, ready for the Easter Egg hunt at the end of the term. They chose their own colours and worked independently to create their own fabulous designs.

Reception also created some lovely Easter cards this term. They did their own cutting and decorating before creating an interesting composition of the chick and the egg.

MOTHER'S DAY CARDS

For Mother's Day, this term, the children learnt how to create origami petals, which they then linked together to make a flower. The children chose their own pastel colours and then developed compositions complete with a flower and some feathers to decorate.

YEAR 1

Year 1 have been learning about Space, and in Art they have been looking at the design process for making rockets or satellites. The children have been practising their drawing skills using basic shapes to draw their vessels as inspiration for their own designs. In pairs, they created a Lego prototype of their own design - with modifications which they are now creating into a 3D model, using junk modelling.

YEAR 2

Year 2 have been looking at dragons, inspired by the book 'Tell Me Dragon' by Jackie Morris. They have all studied a range of dragon designs and illustrations to help them understand where dragon artist's get their ideas from. They have then designed their own dragons in their sketchbooks, complete with annotations describing their influences albeit real or imaginative. The children have been developing their drawing skills by understanding proportion more, pattern in details, as well as improving on their drawing skills using basic shapes. They are now in the process of creating a mixed media painting of their own dragon.

PRE-PREP ART CLUB

During this term's Pre-Prep Art Club the children have been creating their own origami cranes and cubes.











YEAR 3

Year 3 been creating these wonderful illustrations of British birds. They have also modelled 3D birds using clay which will be glazed and finished next term.





YEAR 4

Year 4 have been learning about mixing tertiary colours. They will add more colour and pattern to these paintings to create animal illustrations inspired by the children's book illustrator Poonam Mistry.



YEAR 5

Year 5 have been studying botanical illustrations. These beautiful chalk pastel drawings are inspired by the paintings of the Victorian explorer Marianne North, who has her own gallery in Kew Gardens.





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SCIENCE MODELS COMPETITION

The children in Year 6 were tasked with making a model of a cell (plant, animal, bacteria, or virus) for a house competition, in order to support and cement their understanding of their Science and Engineering topic, Cells and Microbes. They had to choose their materials, label the parts of the cell, and include a description for each part.

There was a huge variety of fantastic models made out of a wide range of materials. The judging proved tricky due to the extremely high standard but we managed, after much deliberation, to decide upon the winners.

Each entry was awarded a house point with further points given for the runners-up, highly commended, and winners. The winning house was Poltimore.

INTERVIEW WITH MICHAEL MANN

What inspired you to write your first book, Ghostcloud? My grandfather used to shovel coal and he was called Luke.

Why did you want to be an author?

It started as a hobby and I got better and I began to wonder if I could turn it into a job.

How did you find a publisher?

First I found an agent on the Internet.

Who publishes your books?

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Hachette - the country's second biggest publisher.

Who do you think you are most like in your books? A mix of Luke and Jess.

Have you always been an author?

I became an author in my early 30s.

What made you write a story about ghosts and not any other mythical creatures?

I think ghosts are cool because they can be spooky and you want to know their past.

Did you think your book was going to get published? No - not until my agent replies.





GIRLS' SPORT

The girls in the Prep department hit the ground running with Netball matches straight after the Christmas break. Showing tremendous resilience throughout the term they played in cold and wet conditions against a number of schools following the BEE Netball format. Chandlings managed to draw the C and D fixtures 0 - 0 and 1 - 1 but at A and B standard they pulled away. The Bs which comprised mainly of Year 5 boys won 2 - 0 whilst the As cruised to another 5 - 2 victory.


The boys were pitted against each other in their house hockey matches. It was very competitive and the overall winners this year were Poltimore.




FRENCH
