VISIT TO THE ABINGDON FOOD BANK

In preparation for Harvest 4H were lucky enough to be invited along to the Abingdon Foodbank. On Monday 30 September we climbed aboard the minibus and Mr Foster drove a very excited class over to Christ Church in Abingdon.



Sarah Fry one of the Foodbank coordinators met us and explained how and why the Foodbank was set up. We found out that the Foodbank had been set up ten years ago to meet the needs of people who are going through a period of crisis and are struggling to feed themselves and their families. There are now 35 volunteers that offer their time and expertise.

We were allowed to look in one of the store cupboards and saw a range of tinned food, fish, meat, fruit and cereals. There were also hygiene products like shower gel and toothpaste. After that, we entered the Church where some early harvest food had been dropped off. We helped carry it through to the main room and learnt how to label the tins. We checked which year and month the food had to be used before and then used a code A, B, C or D depending on which month it would be out of



date. For example, a tin with 'best before' June 2021 would be labelled 21B. Then we used our Maths skills to help label the tins.

The visit taught us a lot about how people's needs can vary and how many volunteers offer their time to help the Foodbank. We then enjoyed presenting this in our class assembly and hoped that our own Harvest celebrations will be used at the Foodbank too.

HARVEST FESTIVAL A TIME TO BE THANKFUL

As autumn began our whole school came together to celebrate Harvest with a time of thankfulness for all we have been given. We had an incredible response to our appeal this year - the tables in the hall were piled high with gifts for the Abingdon Food Bank and for Asylum Welcome. Everyone was invited to



write a thought or a prayer about something they were grateful for on a white star, and these were brought to the front during the service, while we listened to beautiful cello music played by Ms Evans, reminding us that thankful hearts are like lights shining in the darkness. In the afternoon our bumper harvest of gifts were picked up by volunteers from the charities, who were overwhelmed by the amount they had to fit in their cars!

INTERNATIONAL DAY CELEBRATING DIVERSITY AND PROMOTING SUSTAINABILITY

On International Day the children 'visited' over 20 different countries celebrating the nationalities represented at Chandlings. International Day is embraced by the whole school community with around 40 parents from a variety of countries hosting stalls which every child visited to listen, taste and experience different cultures.

The stalls included Japan, India, Singapore, Wales, Portugal, Russia and Germany to name but a few. Parents dressed in their national dress and offered quizzes, facts, games and foods for the children to collect and try. Spain had some delicious tapas to taste, South Korea brought sweet delicacies and France had some snails! All the children visited the stalls



with a unique passport, that needed to be stamped, and a form with questions to complete.



This year there was a new stall called 'Trash Isles' run by the newly founded parents' Eco Group which runs alongside the existing children's Eco Committee. Its aim was to raise awareness of the Great Pacific Garbage patch, highlight the growing problems of climate change and show how we can all live more sustainably.

The rest of International Day was filled with various workshops which the children showcased at the end of the day in the International Day Parade. Year 3 tried their hand at Taekwondo and learnt Korean writing. Year 4 took part in African

drumming, music and dancing. Year 5 'visited' the USA playing basketball, lacrosse and trying some line-dancing and Year 6 learnt other European languages and explored the Seven Wonders of the World.

"It's a day when we can celebrate our differences and unite in diversity," said Miss Wells, Head of Geography, who organised the whole event. "The children love the day and they can learn all about other countries and cultures. It brings together the school community of parents and children showing how we can learn from each other and enrich our lives."

APPLE PRESSING

Every year Chandlings pupils and staff bring in hundreds of apples and pears from home in order to make juice. The initiative is organised by the school's Eco-Council and PATCH also help run the apple pressing during the week. The school hires the apple crusher, apple presser and pasteuriser from a local company, Abingdon Carbon Cutters, who look at different ways of reducing our carbon footprint. The pressed apples fill hundreds of bottles brought in by the children and are subsequently sold at the end of each day. Each year group from Nursery right through to Year 6 have the opportunity to press the apples.



The proceeds go towards other eco-friendly initiatives that the Eco-Council have voted for.

NURSERY AUTUMN OUTINGS

Spookily dressed Nursery children had a wonderful time in the Bluebell Woods with Miss Papp. They enjoyed listening to a story while sitting round the camp. They tried some roasted pumpkin which went down well with some but not everyone!



A hot shower awaited us on our return and we then had some teamwork and leadership games on site, after a hot dinner before our first night's sleep.

Pupils learned different ways of lighting fires as well as cooking flavoured breads and competing in an archery competition. An evening

YEAR 6 SCIENCE EXTENDING AND EXPLORING

Year 6 Science takes the children to scientific places where they haven't been before preparing them for the transition to senior schools. Their knowledge is extended and they develop scientific enquiry skills. We are lucky to have two well-equipped labs offering the children plenty of opportunity for practical work. This includes using the eagerly anticipated Bunsen burners and an opportunity to earn their Bunsen burner license.



Chandlings takes part in the Big Science Event, an annual county competition where the children complete an investigation of their choice. Not surprisingly, Year 6 children often end up using Bunsen burners for their experiment!

For the rest of the Autumn term, they learn about microbes where the optical and digital microscopes open up a hidden aspect of the world. The children make temporary slides and discover the structure of plant and animal cells. During the Spring Term, the children further their knowledge of forces and take part in a cross-curricular STEM project. The hands on electricity and magnetism topic culminates in an investigation into the properties of an electromagnet.

Lastly, in the Summer Term, the children are prepared for the changes that happen during puberty and become equipped with the knowledge they need to make healthy choices about their bodies.

We are always delighted to hear from our alumni that the Chandlings Science curriculum has prepared them for moving on to their senior school and fostered an enthusiasm for the subject which has stayed with them throughout their educational journey.



PRE-PREP ART




Reception had fun using real leaves to make a bowl. They experimented with oxides and glazes to decorate it and make it waterproof.



Year 1 looked at Jurassic giants to learn about colours and experimented with colour mixing and used mixed media. We really enjoyed making Dinosaur fossils.




Year 2 used patterns, mixed media and block printing technique in lessons inspired by the Autumn season. They also used clay to make mushrooms for their gardens.



Year 3 experimented with colours and patterns in a project inspired by F. Hundertwasser. They designed a Lollipop tree or an Imaginary tower by using a layered picture.

PREP ART



Year 6 art scholarship group has been using black and white mixed media to produce drawings based on the German biologist Ernst Haeckel's beautiful lithographs of scientific illustrations.



Year 4 have made 'woodland folk' out of natural found objects such as acorns, feathers and pine cones. They have also created imaginative collages based on Terry Jones' 'Lady Cottington's Pressed Fairy Book' with illustrations by Brian Froud.

Year 6 group project based on the work of the British artist Andy Goldsworthy, highlighting the beauty of leaves at this time of year. The Year 6 groups worked together to create these lovely pieces using oil and ink resist techniques then arranged the leaves into shape, colour, size and pattern.



Year 5 have been making creepy crawlies based on the work of artist Nora Fok.



BOYS' RUGBY

The Rugby World Cup 2019 was a hugely successful tournament on many fronts. It showcased the very best sporting values and camaraderie the game is trying to promote. Here at Chandlings, most boys and girls watched with interest the progress of their favourite teams. Ultimately there were three winners. South Africa lifted the trophy but it was the game itself and Japan as a host nation who were the real heroes.

Inspired by the tournament, Chandlings teams played with distinction on the field of play and replicated Japan as perfect hosts at match tea. This was epitomised for all to see during the rugby House Matches which was very competitive as always.



Year 3 played Tag rugby all term against a host of schools developing their knowledge and understanding of rugby in preparation for contact rugby next year. Year 4 had a great season and did themselves proud at the Abingdon Festival where they did not lose a game.

Year 5 were really committed and very tight as a group. They never gave up in all their matches. By Year 6, Chandlings boys are very accomplished players and this year was no different. They had victories against Beachborough, Kitebrook, Christchurch and Abingdon Prep and played a thrilling 20 - 20 draw against Magdalen.

This year we were proud to host the Cheltenham Prep Rugby Festival, the Grande Finale to the rugby season, as Cheltenham grounds were flooded. Schools came from as far away as Clifton in Bristol. Clifton were a very strong team, but in the same way that Japan was a hero on that day, so was Chandlings.

PREP GIRLS' SPORT

In one of the most exciting Autumn Terms in recent Chandlings History, the Prep girls had the opportunity to be the first to experience the brand new Astroturf in all of its glory.

All girls in the Prep department impressed with their passion and determination in hockey. They adapted well to the increased pace of the game on Astroturf and by the end of the season, their increased time on the pitch in training began to make a difference in matches.

The Year 3 girls loved their first full term of fixtures, facing seven different schools and proving formidable opponents. As they applied dribbling and passing techniques learned in Year 2, they found they were able to manipulate the ball and create space on the pitch, impressing with their skills and knowledge of the game.

Across the term Year 4 progressed from smaller sided matches on a reduced pitch to eventually playing the full 7-a-side version of the game. As they transitioned onto a full half pitch they were able to move the ball over greater distances and eliminate opposition players with their passing. A particular highlight of the season was the Ashfold Festival at which both the A and B teams impressed with their drive and determination.

Year 5 and 6 proudly hosted home matches on our brand new astro including our inaugural U10 Festival at which we were joined by Great Britain and England International Holly Hunt.

Throughout the season teams welcomed the opposition but got straight to business when the whistle blew. In both the U10 and U11 age groups, the girls demonstrated an excellent knowledge of the game and it was clear to see that their movement and linking

play has greatly improved. The U11s quickly gained a reputation for never giving up. Even against tough opposition they refused to lie down and came back from behind on a number of occasions. These qualities were no better demonstrated than at the IAPS Regional Qualifier. Travelling to Cheltenham College to face some huge schools who have grown up playing on Astroturf, the Chandlings team went toe to toe with them. On their way to qualifying for the Cup tournament they beat the likes of Colston Prep and hosts Cheltenham College before being knocked out just two games away from qualifying for Nationals. With the talent coming through and access to our own fantastic facilities, it won't be too long until we make that final step and reach National competitions ourselves.





INTERNATIONAL OUTDOOR CLASSROOM DAY

Children at Chandlings went outdoors to play and learn on Thursday 7 November 2019, as part of the global Outdoor Classroom Day campaign. The campaign – started in the UK in 2012 – aims to make outdoor play and learning part of every child's day as organisers say it is critical to children's health, wellbeing and happiness.

Children often have lessons outside at Chandlings taking advantage of the 60 acres of beautiful grounds. Maths took place in the Bluebell Woods where the Year 4 children learnt about fractions using sticks and the Year 3 children were learning about number bonds on the tennis courts. Year 6 children were outside with microscopes as part of their cell and microbe topic. Year 5 art children were getting very creative making clay faces on the

trees and who said that music can only take place inside? The STEM playground became a musical band and Mr Stratford and some children were playing ukuleles where they have never been played before!





YEAR 6 DEBATING

Following the launch of a weekly debating club at Chandlings, four Year 6 pupils had the opportunity to attend a debating workshop at Rye St Antony in early October. Upon arrival they met pupils from other schools before having lunch which provided much needed brain fuel for the afternoon! The workshop began with some warm up exercises to prepare both mind and body for the mental workout that lay ahead. After a quick improvisational game of 'fortunately... unfortunately', pupils were walked through the procedures of a formal debate and given the opportunity to critically examine arguments by devising points of motion.

After a well-earned cookie break, pairs of pupils were told whether they would be arguing for (proposing) or against (opposing) a particular motion. Jack and Papa were tasked with proposing the motion that girls and boys should be taught separately; whilst Rico and Freyja were given the challenge of arguing that video games are not necessarily harmful to children. Jack and Papa presented a number of arguments in support of single-sex education and were particularly strong in their points of order. A show of hands marginally gave the victory to the opposing team, but given long enough some entrenched positions

may well have been abandoned! With a similar level of flair and some mild gesticulation, Rico and Freyja despatched the opposing team by deploying nuanced and rational critiques of the opposing side's arguments. A show of hands declared them to be the clear winners of the mini debate.

We all had an enjoyable, stimulating and inspiring afternoon and were made to feel very welcome by the English Team at Rye St. Antony. The pupils were fine ambassadors for Chandlings on their inaugural debating trip and were left feeling energised, buoyed and ready for more!



YEAR 6 MCS QUIZ

Ten pupils attended this annual event held on Friday 4 October. We were met on arrival at MCS by an ex-Chandlings pupil and showed to our tables. As usual there were seven rounds of questions, most of which brought looks of confusion among both parents and staff. Our teams however knuckled down and showed great determination and knowledge. David Walliams, Jeff Kinney (author of Diary of a Wimpy Kid), J.K Rowling and Liz Pichon (author of Tom Gates).

8. Who is your favourite author?

I have lots but one in particular is Cressida Cowell; she wrote How to Train Your Dragon.

9. Who is your favourite illustrator?

I love David Melling; he did the illustrations in the Hugless
